CHAIR'S CORNER

November was a very good month to be a participating ASQ member. At the November dinner meeting Dr. Jean Lane, Richland School District superintendent, gave an excellent presentation on the district's journey toward a Washington State Quality Award (WSQA). Dr. Lane discussed the philosophy of performance excellence and highlighted some of the initiatives, including a comprehensive strategic plan, which the district has undertaken to gualify for the award. The WSQA is not an easy award to obtain. It requires a rigorous application of the Baldrige criteria to achieve organizational improvement. It is not my intention to describe either the school district's efforts or the WSQA in detail here but rather to offer a couple of observations that I found particularly important. The first is that even though the school district was collecting data on many aspects of the educational processes, the data were not being evaluated collectively to look for correlations or connections. How many of our own organizations continually collect data without ever taking the time to examine the results and look for connections between one part of the organization and another? Another point is that we often tend to plow ahead with programs and policies without ever stopping to ensure that we are addressing our customers' needs or requirements. In their pursuit of the organizational excellence. Richland School District is paying attention to both of these factors. (As a side note, our own Steve Prevette has agreed to assist in examining some of the districts safety related data.) Finally, Dr. Lane asked if our ASQ section would consider performing an independent assessment of their program. Because we have many certified quality professionals in our membership, I believe that such an activity would be beneficial, not only to the school district, but also as a way to demonstrate section 614 commitment to the community and the practice of quality improvement. Therefore I would appreciate readers contacting anyone on the leadership team to express an interest in participating.

Also in November Tim Koester, the director of our ASQ region 6, delivered a very informative training session

covering topics such as what membership in ASQ means, resources available for members, and orientation for those who might be interested in becoming leaders now or in the future. One interesting statistic that Tim shared is that referrals account for 45% of all new members. So if you have someone in your organization or circle of acquaintances who is interested in knowing more about ASQ, go ahead and invite them to a meeting or event. You could be part of the "Each One Reach One" campaign that ASQ is currently underway.

Remember, our next meeting is a combined gathering with the Mid Columbia Leadership Development Association and Energy Northwest NMA chapter at the Red Lion in Richland on December 10. Should be a really nice event. Hope to see you there. Have a great Thanksgiving. Alvin Langstaff

ASQ CERTIFICATION AND RECERTIFICATION

Your Section does offer Certification Exams and Recertification verification. We have a number of certified members in the Section who may proctor Certification Exams and we strive to find an exam location near you within the Section boundaries.

You may find the upcoming exam dates and exam offerings at <u>http://www.asq.org/certification/dates.html</u>. You may apply for an exam at

http://www.asq.org/certification/apply.html. When you apply, you are able to specify that you are a member of Section 614. When you specify Section 614, that lets the ASQ Headquarters personnel know to send me a notification that you will be taking the exam. I will then arrange for a proctor and a location and let you know where to meet the proctor on exam day.

Many certifications require you to complete "recertification" at three year intervals. This consists of recording your professional activities during the preceding three years, and accumulating 18 points of activities on your paperwork. You may then either send all of your materials to ASQ HQ, or you may contact me and I will meet with you to verify and signoff your checklist. Then you only have to send the one page application to ASQ HQ rather than paying postage to send all of the accompanying proof of activities.

EDITOR'S NOTES

I hope everyone has a happy holiday season.

I have found a lot of interest of late in my statistical work, following Dr. Deming's principles. As noted by Alvin, I've volunteered to help the Richland School District make sense of its employee injury data. I'll be working with the district to better organize the data, automate data retrievals, and, of course, working to make Statistical Process Control charts from their data in order to understand their injuries. Do they come from a stable process, or are there changing conditions that we can be on the lookout for? Hopefully we can have some of the School District folks attend the Red Bead Experiment, currently slated for the February meeting.

I did spend the week of November 17 at the Department of Energy Savannah River plant. Savannah River Nuclear Solutions is committed to implement statistical process control trending of their data. The site had primarily used moving averages in the past, but now I will be helping with the transformation to a new (old) way of statistical thinking.

In addition to this work, Fluor has hooked me up with ELR Consulting in order to provide service to non-Hanford companies. And after five years of ghost-writing presentations for the "Waste Management" annual conferences, I will be attending this year's conference in Phoenix AZ with the topic of implementation of Statistical Process Control at two Department of Energy sites.
