CHAIR'S CORNER



Port of Pasco "Planning for Action: Turning Plans into Reality"

What is a Port and what do they do there? A Port district is a municipal corporation, organized under state law and authorized by a majority vote of the residents in the proposed district. It is governed by a locally elected board of commissioners. The district can be as large as an entire county or as small as a city or town; its boundaries are defined when it is formed.

The Port of Pasco, organized by the voters of Franklin County in 1940, currently provides facilities at the Tri-Cities Airport, the Big Pasco Industrial Center, the Pasco Processing Center, and the Container Barge Terminal, totaling assets worth in excess of \$130 million dollars.

The primary mission of the Port is to promote economic development, maximize the value of their assets, and create sustainable family wage jobs. Their business objectives are to:

- Use partnerships and alliances to identify new business opportunities and to achieve their goals
- Maximize the value of their assets
- Advance economic stability of the District
- Recognize business and tenant retention and recruitment as their first priorities
- Commit to operating safe and environmentally conscious facilities
- Recognize employees as their most valuable asset

Join us on January 4, as Randy Hayden will share more about the Port of Pasco, their guiding principles and some of the exciting projects they are currently involved as well as what's on the horizon.

About the Speaker: Randy Hayden graduated from the University of Washington in 1988 with a degree in Civil Engineering and earned his Professional Engineer's license in 1993. Randy is the Director of Planning & Engineering at the Port of Pasco and joined the Port in September 2000. His primary responsibilities include strategic planning for long range development and master plan implementation at the Port's commercial and industrial sites.

2011 Leadership and Public Speaking Classes and National Management Association (NMA) Leadership Speech Contests - Call for Interested High School Students to Attend - and Volunteers to Assist

The 24th annual National Management Association (NMA) Chapter Speech Contests for High School students are planned for February 17, 2011, with the top two students from the Mid-Columbia Leadership Development Association (MCLDA) and the Energy Northwest NMA Chapters moving on to the Columbia Basin Area Council Contest (CBAC) on March 3, 2011. The winner of that contest will move to the third level of the competition, to be held at the NMA West Leadership Development Conference (LDC) in Anaheim, CA in April or May 2011. There the local student will compete against other winners from the Pacific North, Pacific South and Southwest Regions. The top two from that contest will then advance to face the top two from the East in the National Finals at the NMA Annual Conference in St. Louis, MO, at the Hyatt Regency, September 10-12, 2011.

The NMA Leadership Speech Contest has four primary purposes.

- Promote a better understanding of leadership among high school students.
- Involve youth in researching, writing, and delivering a speech on leadership.
- Provide youth with an incentive to develop communications skills that are vital to those entering the work force and to American business.
- 4. Provide winning students with financial reward that will help them further their formal education.

Ed Schwier, from the local NMA chapter is conducting free Fall/Winter Public Speaking Classes to help high school students prepare for the contests. Even if they don't want to compete, students can attend these classes to improve both their understanding of leadership and communications skills. Classes are currently being held on Tuesday evenings from 5:00 - 7:00 PM in a classroom at the Columbia Basin College Health Science Center in Richland. A second session will be held January 11 to February 15, 2010 (9 weeks total, one session per week). Ed is always looking for additional support from others with classes. As Steven Covey, acclaimed author of The Seven Habits of Highly Effective people and The Eighth Habit: From Effectiveness to Greatness, teaches, we need to find our voice and help others find theirs. Help area students become proficient and effective speakers. That will make them more valuable and productive in tomorrow's workplace. They win and we win, our quality of life will be better because of their efforts. By serving as part of the instruction team or just as an audience member providing feedback on the student's speeches, your contribution will leave a legacy.
