People or Process: Which Has the Greater Effect on Project Success?

"People or Process," as the title implies, looks directly at the role of people versus process in a project's success or failure. The focus on process is a needed component, but does not obviate the need to manage people. Unfortunately, the trend over the last 15 years has been to focus on process and reduce the project to a checklist of tasks. This has created a culture that often neglects the value of a manager with people skills.

This presentation will use case studies to underscore how people make or break the project. Attendees will learn the importance of working closer with the people on the project by looking at four areas:

- The Project Manager
- Project Inception
- Project Methodology
- Technical team members

By the end of the presentation, attendees will understand the importance of balancing people and process and where to focus their efforts. The benefit of being more involved with the inner workings of the project will be evident.

PASSWORD MANAGEMENT

This topic came up in conversation over dinner at January's monthly section meeting.

What is the world's best program for managing all your passwords? LastPass! For several reasons:

- It is free
- It is absolutely secure
- It is cross-platform

We all know that passwords should be protected. When you write them down or print them out, you greatly increase your security risk. We also know that you should use one password for all your sites. If someone finds that password, your identity is exposed to the world. Passwords should be complicated and long, usually at least eight characters, numbers, and symbols. They should be portable across all your machines, including smart phones, and locations.

LastPass satisfies all these criteria. It is available at lastpass.com and works on Mac, Windows, and Linux machines. It works on all browsers. While the apps for iPhone, Blackberry, and Android require a "premium" account of \$1 a month, you can always log into the LastPass site for free.

LastPass uses secure communications for your connection. The "glob" of your data is encrypted in the cloud and nobody, not even LastPass employees can discover your master password. It is never kept! For an in-depth analysis of its security, check out <u>grc.com</u> and search for LastPass.

When you set up a new account at Google, your bank, or Amazon, LastPass will offer to fill in the information about you that it knows from your (encrypted) profile. It will offer to generate a unique password, up to 100 characters long, using letters, digits, and symbols. Once you accept the new password, it is saved and forever available until you change it. (You do routinely change sensitive passwords, don't you?) When you go back to your new site, LastPass will automatically fill in your user name and password for that site. You can even let it log you in automatically. You are in control.
