Has the Analytics Wave Changed How We "Do" Quality?

There's no denying it - the analytics movement has become the hot topic across almost every industry. Everyone is getting into the act, or so it seems. This naturally raises the question, "Do we need to change the way we approach Quality Management" as a result? Are the tools and techniques that have been used for decades now still relevant? You may have even wondered if your skills are still applicable in today's marketplace.

In this session, veteran quality professional Dave Northcutt will discuss several aspects of the analytics movement and how these aspects relate to quality management in today's world. Among the topics to be discussed:

Come join us for a virtual meeting discussion. Erin Brown, ASQ San Francisco Secretary, attended the conference which was held on December 9, 2020. She will provide a summary from the conference and tell us about her experiences and insights from the conference.

In case you missed it, this is how the conference was advertised by ASQ:

Women account for nearly half of the U.S. labor force and hold approximately 50% percent of all management and professional-level jobs. However, American women lag substantially behind men in leadership positions, filling only 6% of the CEO roles at S&P 500 companies. Over the past five years, however, the number of women in corporate senior leadership has grown, and the watershed congressional election of 2018 saw a record 117 women voted into public office. The conversation around redefining professional success and changing how corporations choose leaders is getting louder, with more women adding their voices to the discussion.

ASQ's inaugural Women in Quality Symposium provides a unique avenue for women to establish meaningful connections, identify professional and personal development strategies, and be recognized for their unique capabilities to lead in a convenient, connected virtual space. A diverse symposium agenda allows attendees to tap into thought leaders, other quality colleagues, and their own experiences to nurture and enhance career growth and build a framework for a future with more women at the helm.

Beyond the Sticker and the Certificate (Ensuring Better Measurements and Reducing Risk)

We encounter measurements in everyday life, starting with the time on our alarm clock, volume of water for our morning coffee or tea, temperature of our refrigerator and freezer, water pressure in our shower, noise level settings for our video conferencing, electricity to power our homes and devices, scale to track our weight gain during the pandemic, luminance levels in our lights, and more.

For automotive companies, specific tolerances must be met so that parts properly fit and function. We give very little thought to these measurements until something goes wrong. Sometimes automobiles and parts fail due to faulty measurements.

What can we do to improve our measurements and lower our risk of costly and deadly failures? There are international quality and technical standards which provide guidance in these areas. Join us and learn what you can do to ensure better measurements and reduce risks.

FEBRUARY IS BLACK HISTORY MONTH

There have been many extraordinary accomplishments in our country made by Black Americans over the years. The more obvious ones that come to mind are Martin Luther King Jr., Harriet Tubman, Rosa Parks (and many others). Here are some more.

Matthew Alexander Henson teamed up with Robert Peary on an expedition to find the North Pole. In 1909, the pair finally reached their destination and became the first people to ever set foot there.

Jesse Owens was a world-class athlete who set an Olympic record for the long jump in 1936, which he held for 25 years. He also earned four gold medals for the U.S. at the games.

George Washington Carver was an agricultural scientist and inventor. He launched the Tuskegee Institute Movable School to introduce farmers to new techniques and advancements, and now there are Movable schools across the country.

Shirley Chisholm was the first Black woman elected to Congress, serving from 1969-1983. She formally announced her presidential bid in 1972 and became the first woman to run for the Democratic party's presidential nomination.

Gordon Parks was the first Black staff member at Life magazine, which launched his career in photography and film. His photos were featured in publications like Vogue, and he went on to become the first Black director of a major film, "Shaft."

FEBRUARY IS LOW VISION AWARENESS MONTH

Support Edith Bishel Center for the Blind and Visually Impaired

Did you know that two million adults ages 40 and over have advanced macular degeneration, 24.4 million have cataracts, 7.7 million have diabetic retinopathy, 2.7 million have glaucoma, and 3 million have low vision? These numbers are expected to increase as the population of older adults grows.

There are several ways to help prevent vision loss. Regular comprehensive dilated eye exams are the most important thing one can do to help protect their sight. Many age-related eye diseases don't have any early symptoms, but they can often be detected and treated if found during an eye exam.

Lifestyle factors can also play a role in protecting vision. Eat a balanced diet that includes dark, leafy greens and fish high in omego-3 fatty acids. Don't smoke. Maintain a healthy weight. Keep diabetes under control. Wear sunglasses and a brimmed hat outdoors. Wear protective eyewear to keep eyes safe when mowing the lawn, working with power tools, etc. Know your family's eye health history and discuss it with your eye care professional.

The Edith Bishel Center for the Blind and Visually Impaired is a 501(c)(3) nonprofit organization dedicated to serving the blind and visually impaired in southeastern Washington. Their mission is to enrich the independence and quality of life for individuals who are blind and visually impaired. The Center is located in Kennewick and serves Benton, Franklin, Walla Walla, Columbia, Yakima, and Klickitat counties.

Consider volunteering to help them out with marketing, administrative support, grant writing, or fundraising activities. Monetary donations are also welcome and will help keep the Center open and programs operational. Just \$10 a month provides magnifiers for low-income clients. \$25 a month funds two in-home visits per year by an Independent Living Skills instructor.
