Chair's Corner - Continuous Improvement/Innovation

Recent global events have created an unprecedented disruption of supply chains in the electronic chip, or semiconductor industry. The subsequent supply shortages have affected numerous industries, perhaps most notably being that of the automotive industry. Many articles have been published on the cause, status, and predictions for future market implications of the chip shortages experienced by large automakers (see WSJ).

I have personally found this topic to be extremely interesting, as it resides at the intersection of quality, engineering, and business and has a profound global economic impact. In addition, it has dramatically altered the course of research and engineering projects that I have been involved with.

One thing that stands out in the Wall Street Journal article linked above is that the auto manufacturers have maintained the use of inexpensive components called microcontrollers. These types of components are inexpensive, have existed for decades and offer excellent reliability. The chip manufacturers, however, do not enjoy large profits from the production of such components. Accordingly, microcontroller production has dipped in favor of higher margin semiconductors used in consumer electronics.

Many of the auto manufacturers either have (Tesla) or will (GM, Ford, and others) begin utilizing newer chip technologies or develop their own "feature-rich" devices that will be specific to automotive use. The idea being that elimination of outdated technology (albeit perfectly sufficient for the current application) will enable greater supply depth and development of unique devices may secure a consistent future production niche within the semiconductor industry.

We often think of continuous improvement as a method for adding value to products. In most cases, however, it is critical that innovation be paired with the continuous improvement cycle to assure that a high-value product can continue to be offered. While innovation is typically linked to a substantive change in functionality of a product or disruption of a market, persistent and incremental innovation may be a smaller necessary step for inclusion in electronics hardware development moving forward. Hardware designs must keep pace with the rapidly evolving semiconductor industry. I imagine that the large auto manufacturers would reconsider their previous stance on this in light of recent events.

The latest market data suggest that the auto industry's continued use of highly reliable, and low-cost semiconductors will have scratched nearly 8 million vehicles from production lines and result in more than \$200B in lost revenue globally in 2021. A significant price to pay for a \$50 chip. A trade study involving electronic component cost, function, parts availability, and vehicle price will surely be at the center of the discussion in the months ahead.

Neural Science at the Micro and Nano Scales



William C. Tang, PhD

Professor of Biomedical Engineering, Electrical Engineering & Computer Science, Material Science & Engineering

Neural implants are developed to interact with the nervous system in hopes of restoring sensory, motor, or cortical functions that can improve or maintain the health of individuals suffering from various forms of neural trauma or degeneration.

The major challenge of any *in vivo* devices is the natural immune responses to foreign bodies, which would render the device ineffective within months. Studying neuronal tissues cultured *in vitro* with microelectrode arrays offers an excellent alternative to ascertain neural network activities in a well-controlled environment that isolates and pinpoints a specific aspect of neuronal physiology. In particular, the hippocampus can be studied *in vitro* without the confounding complexity of the rest of the brain, allowing fundamental understanding of memory formation and retrieval at the cellular and subnetwork levels within the hippocampus. Complexity and sophistication of *in vitro* studies, particularly in 3D reconstruction of the neural network, can be progressively added to further expand our understanding of the central nervous system.

This presentation focuses on the tools to study neuronal tissues *in vitro* to understand neural network behaviors at the micro and nano scales.

About the speaker: William C. Tang received his BS, MS, and PhD degrees in Electrical Engineering and Computer Sciences from the University of California at Berkeley. His seminal thesis and invention of the electrostatic comb drive has been internationally recognized as one of the key building blocks of Micro-electromechanical Systems (MEMS) sensors and actuators, and is the most widely-cited work in the field for over two decades. Since his graduation, Dr. Tang contributed to the automotive industry at Ford Motor Company and space exploration at the Jet Propulsion Laboratory. He served as the DARPA Program Manager for various MEMS programs. In 2002, he was appointed Professor of Biomedical Engineering and Electrical Engineering & Computer Science at the University of California, Irvine. Later, he was also jointly appointed with the Chemical and Biomolecular Engineering and the Materials Science and Engineering Departments. The first Associate Dean for Research in the Henry Samueli School of Engineering from 2008 to 2013, Dr. Tang's research interests include micro- and nano-scale biomedical engineering, neural engineering, neuropathology and clinical applications. He is a Senior Member of the Institute of Electrical and Electronics Engineers, a Fellow and Chartered Physicist with the Institute of Physics, and a Fellow of the American Institute for Medical and Biological Engineering.

ARE YOUR ENERGY COSTS GETTING SCARY?

Kilowatts and megajoules and therms, oh my! And when those electric and gas bills arrive, they can certainly be frightful. Here are some tips that may help as Halloween and colder weather approaches:

Things that go bump in the night – aka, your heating system. Now is probably a good time to schedule service to make sure it's operating efficiently on those cooler nights ahead. Even a simple change or cleaning of your filter can help. Replacing dirty filters with clean ones can reduce your energy consumption up to 15%, according to the Department of Energy. Depending on your lifestyle and type of furnace, it's recommended to change them every 90 days.

Adjust the temp – When you're home during the day, set the thermostat at a temperature that's comfortable. At night or when you're away, if you set it back 10 to 15 degrees you can save about 10% a year.

Energy up in smoke – If you never use your fireplace, plug and seal the chimney flue. But if you do use the fireplace, install tempered glass doors and a heat-air exchange system that blows warmed air back into the room.



14 Thoughts About Building a Great Culture

- 1. **Great leaders build and drive great cultures.** They know it's their number one priority. They can't delegate it. They must lead and be engaged in the process.
- 2. Culture is the reason why great organizations have sustained success. Culture drives expectations and beliefs. Expectations and beliefs drive behavior. Behavior drives habits. Habits create the future.
- 3. **Culture beats strategy.** Strategy is important but it is your culture that will determine whether your strategy is successful.
- 4. If you focus on the fruit of the tree (outcomes and numbers) and ignore the root (culture) your tree will die. But if you focus on and nourish the root you always have a great supply of fruit.
- 5. When building a team and organization you must shape your culture before it shapes you. Culture is forming whether you like it or not. The key is to identify what you want your culture and organization to stand for. Once you know the values and principles that you stand for, every decision is easy to make; including the people you recruit and hire.
- 6. A culture of greatness doesn't happen by accident. It happens when a leader expects greatness and each person in the organization builds it, lives it, values it, reinforces it and fights for it.
- 7. **Culture is dynamic, not static.** Everyone in your organization creates your culture by what they think, say and do each day. Culture is lead from the top down but it comes to life from the bottom up.
- 8. Your culture is not just your tradition. It is the people in your building who carry it on. –Brad Stevens, Head Coach, Boston Celtics
- 9. When leading a new team or organization, it will take longer to build a new culture if you allow negative people from the previous culture to contaminate the process.
- 10. When you build a strong positive culture, most of the energy vampires will leave by themselves because they don't fit in. But you may also have to let a few energy vampires off the bus.
- 11. Creating a culture where people are afraid to fail leads to failure. Allowing people to fail and learn from failure ultimately leads to success.
- 12. Change is a part of every culture and organization. Embracing change and innovating will ensure that your organization thrives.
- 13. Progress is important but when innovating and driving change, make sure you honor your tradition, purpose and culture. This generates power from your past to create your future.
- 14. **Culture is like a tree.** It takes years to cultivate and grow and yet it can be chopped down in a minute. Protect your culture.
