#### **CAN YOU SEE ME NOW?**

August is National Eye Exam Month, and even if you think you currently have 20/20 vision, it's important to get regular checkups. I just had one, and that's probably at least part of what prompted my interest in this topic. Everyone wants to see as well as possible, right?

I got to thinking about how many of us may "see" things very differently and how sometimes our different "views" can result in miscommunications and/or conflicts.

Nearsightedness: Do you find it easier to stick with the tried-and-true, things you are already familiar with? Is it somewhat stressful (possibly very stressful) to be in a new social situation or to take the lead in a conversation with someone you've just met? We've probably all been there, at least to some degree. It can sometimes be challenging to take on a new task or to consider an idea that's not in our current comfort zone.

Farsightedness: Do you do thrive in strategic, long-term planning and in seeing the "big" picture? Is it hard sometimes to deal with the smaller, more short-term details? It can take some real effort to break things down into the baby steps needed to achieve long-term success.

Astigmatism: Do you have difficulty concentrating on a specific task for more than a short time? Is it hard to be a focused, active listener when a teammate, friend or family member is making suggestions for improvements? After a few minutes in a meeting or discussion, do some things seem crystal clear while others feel very blurry? It's not always easy to listen closely without getting distracted by our own thoughts or to consider feedback from others in a positive manner.

Can we improve our eyesight? Many eye exercises are touted as ways to naturally improve eyesight and overcome nearsightedness. But we usually can't correct our actual vision without professional help, and there is no quick-and-easy fix for eyesight problems. However, with tools such as good nutrition and diet, you can still help your eyesight naturally and on your own.

Similarly, with a little assistance from others (e.g., books, workshops/training, coaching/mentoring), we can improve ourselves, our outlooks, and our attitudes. There are a number of tools and techniques - making the effort to be more open to seeing (and considering) the ideas of others, focusing on the most important goals first, etc. – that can help with how we view and react to the ever-evolving world around us.

We may need to admit that we can't do it all on our own, and we might have to reach for our reading glasses from time to time.

Life-long learning and growth are great goals to reach for.

## Linear Regression and Multiple Regression Models: Theory and Applications



## N.T. "Bala" Balakrishnan, MBA, CQE, CSSBB Professor, Cal Poly Pomona

Managerial decisions are often based on intuitive reasoning of relationships between variables. For example, a marketing manager may use his experience in the business to predict sales based on product price and advertising expenditures. Or the Dean of an Engineering School may predict starting salaries of the graduating class based on student GPA and years of experience. In both examples there is rationality in the intuitive reasoning process.

The next step is to pose the question: Are there quantitative models that can institutionalize a rational approach that can validate (or invalidate) this reasoning process?

Regression models can use historic data to develop relationships for use in predicting sales (marketing manager example) and starting salaries (Engineering Dean's example). In regression terminology, sales and starting salaries are dependent variables, while price, advertising expenses and GPA and experience are independent variables.

This presentation combines Theory and Application of Linear and Multiple Regression and reports using Excel software. Also covered will be associative models that do not have cause/effect relationships.

<u>About the speaker:</u> Professor N.T. "Bala" Balakrishnan has over 40 years' experience in Industry and Academia, having held several positions as Quality Manager, Manufacturing Engineering Manager in companies including United Technologies, IBM, and 3M Standard Abrasives. He is currently a professor in the Technology & Operations Department, College of Business Administration, California State Polytechnic University, Pomona.

Bala has led Kaizen teams and implemented continuous improvement programs, used Design of Experiments to improve processes, conducted process capability studies, reduced cost of quality, and improved effectiveness of operations using Quality Management software.

## INCOSE WESTERN STATES REGIONAL CONFERENCE

### September 14-16 in Richland In-person or Virtual

The International Council on Systems Engineering (INCOSE) Conference will be held at the Pacific Northwest National Laboratory (PNNL) this year. ## 10 MORE STEPS TO HELP YOU STAY SAFE THIS SUMMER

As we continue to enjoy the sunshine and warm weather of summer, here are 10 more steps you can follow to help keep

you safe. (See last month's newsletter for the first 10 or click here for the full list.)

## Summer is a great time for a picnic. But be careful with grilling, which causes 10,000 home fires every year.

- **11.** Wash your hands, utensils, and workstation before preparing the food.
- **12.** Separate uncooked meats, poultry, and seafood from ready-to-eat foods like salads, fruits, vegetables, cheeses, and desserts. Use separate plates and utensils to prevent cross-contamination.
- **13.** Always supervise a barbecue grill when in use. Never grill indoors. Keep the grill out in the open, away from the house, deck, tree branches or anything else that could catch fire.
- **14.** Make sure everyone, including pets, stays away from the grill.
- **15.** Don't leave food out in the hot sun. Keep perishable foods in a cooler with plenty of ice or freezer gel packs.

Camping is one of the most popular outdoor recreational activities in the U.S. Being prepared for emergencies is critical when you are headed to an area with limited access to phone services and help.

- **16.** Know the level of ability of the people in your group and the environment around you. Plan accordingly.
- **17.** Pack a first aid kit to handle insect stings, sprains, cuts and bruises and other injuries that could happen.
- **18.** Sprains and falls are some of the most common misfortunes travelers may face. Dehydration is also a danger. Take a first aid and CPR/AED course and download this free <a href="mailto:guide">guide</a> and/or <a href="mailto:app">app</a> so that you will know what to do in case help is delayed.
- **19.** Share your travel plans and locations with a family member, neighbor, or friend.
- **20.** Bring nutritious food items and water, light-weight clothing to layer and supplies for any pets.
