Practical Applications of Reliability (Quality over Time)

Why use reliability?

Reliability techniques help to answer questions such as:

What is the expected life of a product? Does this product meet the reliability requirements? How many more failures are we expecting in the next month? What are the warranty costs? How do the design changes affect product reliability?

This webinar will provide a practical view of Reliability as it relates to Quality and Customer Experience. You will gain an understanding of reliability main concepts and the applications of reliability methods and learn to determine the lifetime characteristics of a product using both graphical and analysis methods. Several hands-on examples of Weibull Analysis and Interpretations will be included.

Other topics to be covered include Bathtub Curve, Weibull Distribution, Analysis and Graphical Interpretations, Failure Forecasting, Censored and Suspended Data, Sample Sizes, Tips and Tricks, Case Studies using SuperSmith, Minitab, and Weibull++ Software.

About the speaker: Ha Dao, ASQ Fellow, retired from Emerson as Technical Quality Manager, where he was responsible for development and deployment of an enterprise approach to Quality Excellence (Quality, Reliability & Customer Experience). 2023 ASQE INSIGHTS ON EXCELLENCE CATEGORY STUDY - VOICE OF CUSTOMER AND LEADERSHIP

ASQE Report Now Available

The world is changing rapidly, and the desires and expectations of customers are changing with it. Much of what was forward-thinking even five years ago is now considered the norm, and what differentiates the success of one business from another is often who can meet or, better yet, exceed customer expectations the fastest. To do that, organizations must understand what their customers currently want while anticipating what they will need in the future.

To stay on top of customer needs and market trends, effective leadership needs to understand the complex, interconnected requirements of the customer, the capability of their workforce, the real versus perceived value of innovative tech options, and the vulnerabilities that new tech can introduce.

In this Category Study, ASQE explores the connectivity of two Insights on Excellence® (IoE) categories - Voice of Customer and Leadership - providing a deeper look at significant data and key findings to complement the larger suite of IoE research.

Some interesting findings:

- 51% of respondents chose 'delays from suppliers' as the most selected ongoing quality issue in 2022
- 44% of respondents indicated that their organizations will be increasing the involvement of Quality professionals in environmental, social, and governance (ESG) initiatives in the next three years
- 32% of Quality professionals selected 'lack of certification training in quality methodologies' for employees as a top workforce challenge in 2022
- Only 29% of 2020-2022 IoE respondents completely agreed that their organizations have committed to future investments in digital or Industry 4.0

Columbia Basin Project Management Institute (PMI) Hybrid Meeting

Colin Fogarty has always been drawn to the notion that we are surrounded by history and that it is up to us to see it. As a public radio journalist at Oregon Public Broadcasting, his stories were heard frequently on NPR, and he won regional and national awards. He covered state and regional politics, Oregon's landmark Death with Dignity law, the bankruptcy of the Archdiocese of Portland and many other issues.

Along the way, Colin kept returning to the theme of history and its role in our everyday lives. He produced stories on the Columbia River's Indigenous cultures, Lewis and Clark, and the silencing of Celilo Falls. Colin spent the last seven years of his public radio career as regional editor of public radio's Northwest News Network, where he managed a team of reporters covering the issues and state legislatures in Washington, Oregon, and Idaho.

In 2014 Colin became executive director of Confluence, a community-supported nonprofit with the mission to connect people to the history, living cultures, and ecology of the Columbia River system through Indigenous voices. His presentation will focus on how they strive to do this, by working through art landscapes, educational programs, and public gatherings in a collaborative effort.

The vision of SIGN Fracture Care is to create equality of fracture care throughout the world. Their mission is to give the injured poor access to fracture surgery by donating orthopaedic education and implant systems to surgeons in developing countries.

Patients in these developing countries would have severe disabilities due to their fractures if their surgeons were not well-trained and have access to SIGN implants. These surgeons understand fracture principles and enthusiastically treat those in need using sophisticated equipment.

Donors are essential to the network as the number of SIGN programs and different implants increases. SIGN is a registered non-profit corporation; 90% percent of their 2022 budget went directly to supply the SIGN surgeons with the implants and training needed to care for their patients.

PREVENTING SEXUAL HARASSMENT IN THE WORKPLACE

HRDQ-U Webinar

December 20 from 11:00 am to 12 noon PST

This webinar, presented by Peter R. Garber, is designed to give participants a better understanding of what is and is not permissible concerning people's behaviors in the workplace. The program defines sexual and other forms of harassment, and what to do if participants or a coworker become a victim of this unwanted behavior. Examples and scenarios will be presented depicting several types of sexual harassment and what should be done in these situations.

An important theme throughout the program is that regardless of the harasser's position in the organization, he or she should be held to the same rules and standards concerning sexual harassment as everyone else.

How leaders conduct themselves concerning conforming to the established harassment policies in the company can have a major impact on the behaviors of those in their reporting hierarchies. There cannot be a "do as I say, not as I do" prevailing practice throughout the organization. Leaders must set the example for appropriate behavior in their workplaces at all times.

Victims of sexual harassment often fear retaliation for reporting such behavior. It is this fear of retaliation that keeps many from doing so, especially when it involves their boss or someone in a higher position in the organization. As a result, the percentage of incidents of sexual harassment that go unreported each year is shocking. The assorted reasons for this occurring will be presented and discussed during the program.

7 BUDGET-FRIENDLY TIPS TO KEEP YOUR HOME WARM THIS WINTER

Looking for ways to keep your house warmer in the winter months? In addition to being easy enough for most homeowners to tackle, these ideas won't cause your utility bills to flare up, even as the temperatures outside plunge.

- Use a Space Heater (do some research before you buy, and use it safely)

- Hang Heavy Drapes (be sure they don't block radiators or floor registers)
- ✓ Weatherstrip to prevent cold air from getting in
- Decorate Bare Walls (cases full of books are especially effective at helping maintain a stable temperature)
- Reverse Ceiling Fans (clockwise rotation pushes hotter air down)
- Insulate Your Water Heater if it's an older model
- ✓ Perform Manufacturer's Recommended Preventive Maintenance (changing filters, etc.)

ALLEN JOHNSON'S WORLD: LESSON LEARNED ALONG THE WAY

Allen Johnson's World was the brainchild of Allen Johnson, a Tri-Citian, who was a well-known educator, author, and international traveler and speaker, who passed away in November.

With over 50 years of experience in writing, photography, videography, and psychology, Allen was always an educator in one form or the other: high school teacher, university professor, organizational trainer and consultant, and international keynote speaker. He was a frequent newspaper columnist and the author of six popular fiction and non-fiction books. He loved jazz and was a composer, pianist, and vocalist.

Allen always said he was only interested in making a modest contribution to the world by sharing what he had learned through the years. That's why he initially created *Allen Johnson's World* – as a single location where all of his knowledge and experiences could find a friendly home.

Shortly before his passing, Allen created a final video to pay tribute to the many friends, family, and colleagues he cherished, and to share a few final words of wisdom. It was part of his final wishes that this video be posted for the world to see and remember him by.

I encourage you to check out Allen's <u>final video</u> here. I have captured some of his key points - things that he believed were most important - from the video below:

- If you have a choice between being right or being kind, choose being kind.
- Take care of your body.
- Seek and maintain your friendships.
- Never write a letter when you are angry.
- Seek a principle-centered life.
- Be transparent, non-judgmental, and empathic.
- Read!
- Never allow a cell phone to eclipse the real live person.
- Mentor young people.
- · Become a citizen of the world.

A personal note: I knew Allen, mostly as an educator and entertainer. He was a featured speaker at a couple of our local Association for Quality and Participation (AQP) professional meetings many years ago. (AQP later merged with ASQ.)
