Random Acts of Kindness Week

is February 9-15, and the official Random Acts of Kindness Day is February 17. But we shouldn't need an official proclamation to do good things every day.

In today's environment, where everyone seems to have so many things to do, people to see, and places to go, it sometimes feels like kindness and courtesy have begun to take a back seat. Acts of kindness may not be high on everyone's priority list.

I was getting in line at the only available checkout at the grocery store the other day, with just a handful of items. The fellow in front of me had a full shopping cart. He saw me, smiled, and invited me to go ahead of him. That small act of kindness made me feel really good.

When someone does something nice for another individual (without being asked), it usually improves the day for both of them. And if you happen to be feeling a little down or out of sorts, practicing random acts of kindness may help. A study from The Ohio State University found that people suffering from depression or anxiety may find relief in doing nice things for others. Another study from the University of Oxford found that performing acts of kindness over the course of a week boosted happiness.

The good news is that practicing kindness can be done in simple ways that don't take much time or effort but can pay off in big ways. Here are just a few ways you can start at almost any time.

- Check in with someone who may be lonely or has recently suffered a loss
- Pick up a few extra groceries/offer to shop for someone
- Find fun and unusual ways to reuse and recycle (<u>ideas</u>)
- Reward good service/businesses with complimentary reviews
- Tell a friend you care (send a card or email)
- Let someone go ahead of you in line (or pay for someone's coffee or meal)
- Donate items you don't need (ideas)
- Take a photo for someone (let them be in the picture)

Next Exam will be offered in April

ASQE recently announced that the <u>ASQ Certified</u> <u>Construction Quality Manager (CCQM)</u> is now available online. This new credential is designed to enhance construction quality and ensure sustainable practices across the industry and is a testament to ASQ's commitment to driving excellence and innovation in construction quality management.

The development of the CCQM certification was a major collaborative effort between ASQ and ASQE, spearheaded by ASQ's Design and Construction Division (DCD), with significant contributions from construction subject matter experts from across many industry segments. This collaborative approach ensured that the certification is globally relevant and reflects the latest industry standards and best practices.

Is this certification for you? The Certified Construction Quality Manager (CCQM) is a professional who ensures construction projects adhere to rigorous quality standards throughout their lifecycle. A CCQM oversees contract development, strategic quality planning, resource management, the design process, required documentation, and project closure. They apply principles of quality control, team building, project management best practices, risk management, environmental and social governance, and safety management to enhance construction project quality and achieve planned outcomes. Additionally, they utilize statistical methods and quality tools to analyze and improve construction processes, ensuring that the final deliverables meet all stakeholder expectations and industry and quality standards.

HOW TO MAKE AND INTERPRET A STATEMENT OF CONFORMITY

ASQ Inspection Division Virtual Webinar February 11 from 4:00 pm to 5:30 pm PST

When a calibration report is provided by a calibration supplier, a typical concern for the customer is to know if the item calibrated is within the tolerance specified so it can be used with confidence. While this traditional approach is still thought to be fine over the years, measurement science has evolved where it is not a simple binary issue of a "pass" or "fail" status within manufacturer's specification.

Laboratory accreditation to ISO/IEC 17025 has advanced the good practices related to calibration to include more information to the process of calibrating an item and calling it within conformance ("pass" or "fail").

This presentation describes what is involved in making a statement of conformity. What was traditionally the job of a calibration laboratory ("the experts") to make a call ("pass" or "fail") now requires interaction up front from the customer before they can make that call on a calibration certificate. The contract review phase becomes more important in specifying the calibration requirements by the customer.

Presenter Dilip A. Shah will educate both consumers and suppliers of calibration services on what is required of them to ensure that an appropriate pass or fail call is made to meet the requirements of the customer when a calibration activity takes place.

WINTER WARM UP / WINTER TUNE UP

Now that we are well into our coldest season, it's time for a reminder to be ready for winter weather. A few important tips and precautions can make all the difference during this time of year.

Make sure your car is winter-ready: Keep an emergency pack in your vehicle filled with an emergency blanket, a first aid kit, some nonperishable snacks, cables, and more. Also, remember to check your fluid levels before each road trip and have your car regularly serviced including winter tires if you are in an area that needs them. Make sure to caulk and weatherstrip doors and windows to keep out unwanted drafts and moisture. Ensure your smoke and carbon monoxide detector batteries are working and have your chimney inspected each year.
