WHAT IS GRATITUDE AND WHY IS IT SO IMPORTANT?

Many of us express gratitude by saying "thank you" to someone who has helped us or given us a gift. From a scientific perspective, however, gratitude is not just an action: it is also a positive emotion that serves a biological purpose. Positive psychology defines gratitude in a way where scientists can measure its effects and thus argue that gratitude is more than feeling thankful: it is a deeper appreciation for someone (or something) that produces longer lasting positivity.

Gratitude is an emotion similar to appreciation, and positive psychology research has found neurological reasons why so many people can benefit from this general practice of expressing thanks for our lives, even in times of challenge and change.

Purpose of this Emotion: People can use gratitude to form new social relations or to strengthen current ones. Acts of gratitude can be used to apologize, make amends, and help solve other problems. Alternatively, people may feel gracious because it can be an intrinsically rewarding process. Simply being grateful for being alive is a great way to motivate oneself to seize the day.

The idea that tomorrow is not guaranteed is a strong motivator for some people to be their "best self" today.

Why Gratitude Works: Gratitude is a selfless act. Its acts are done unconditionally, to show people that they are appreciated. "A gift that is freely given" is one way to understand what these acts are like. For example, if someone is sad and you write them a note of appreciation, you are likely not asking for something in return from this person; instead, you are reminding them of their value and expressing gratitude for their existence. At the moment, you are not waiting for a "return note" from this person.

Even when we do not expect a return, sometimes it happens. Gratitude can be contagious, in a good way. In the previous example, maybe when you are feeling down, this person will write you a note or send you a card.

The Effects of Gratitude: In a study by McCraty and colleagues, 45 adults were taught to "cultivate appreciation and other positive emotions." The results of this study showed that there was a mean 23% reduction in the stress hormone cortisol after the intervention period. During the use of the techniques, 80% of the participants exhibited an increased coherence in heart rate variability patterns, indicating reduced stress. In other words, these findings suggest that people with an "attitude of gratitude" experience lower levels of stress.

Next time you have a free moment, try practicing some gratitude. You might just be surprised by the benefits it brings you.

Is ISO 9001 Still Relevant? A Closer Look at the Review Process and How it Remains Pertinent

ISO 9001 is an international management system standard that specifies requirements for a quality management system. Organizations use the standard to demonstrate their ability to consistently provide products and services that meet customer and regulatory requirements, as well as the organization's own requirements.

It has been nearly 10 years since ISO 9001 was last updated, and there have been a lot of changes over that decade.

Given all that has changed, is the standard still pertinent to today's businesses?

How do we ensure it remains relevant?

The technical community has heard these concerns and is in the process of updating ISO 9001. This presentation will take a deep dive into the review process to explore how ISO 9001 remains applicable. This will include examination of how the standard is reviewed and how new technologies such as AI and climate change are considered.

STRATEGIC DEVELOPMENTAL MAPPING PROCESS

Strategic Developmental Mapping is a methodology developed by Industrial and Organizational Psychologist Dr. Leesa Duckworth. She created the Strategic Mapping process in 2005 and has been offering it to both individuals and organizations actively since 2012. This technique looks at the psychological aspects of how people connect to their work and how to optimize the paths of individuals, groups, and organizations and the processes they impact or employ.

Why is the Strategic Developmental Mapping process so important today? Today's workforce is struggling.

Early career employees entering the workforce are often lost, have no idea where they might fit into the workforce or why, and have difficulty even articulating what makes them stand out from the pack, much less being able to create a hype to which they would have to live up. This is reflected in the increasingly common effect of a candidate's inability to explain why they applied to a position or why they chose the organization itself.

The disillusionment epidemic is not limited to only fresh, new workers. Established employees in many cases are feeling burnt out and disillusioned with their jobs, career choices. and even employers. Seasoned employees want to do what they love and love what they do, and there is rarely a mechanism to help them align the two. This has created an increasing trend in workplace burn-out, loss of productivity, and even absenteeism, which may ultimately result in an economic loss to the organization.

Dr. Duckworth will share details about how the Mapping process can help individuals design an effective roadmap to success.
